- As the Mother of God, she goes in haste to meet her cousin Elizabeth in love and service.
- 2. Mary contemplates God in a helpless babe and adores the Immanuel in faith, lying on a bed of straw at Bethlehem.
- Through trials, anxiety and in faith, Mary flees into Egypt with Jesus and Joseph.
- She ponders over the prophecy of Simeon while she presents Jesus at the Temple.
- Mary's sensitivity to the needs of others brings joy to the wedding celebration at Cana.
- The climax of Mary's journey of faith is exemplified at the foot of the Cross where she stands one with Jesus on the cross. Mother Mary as my model and guide has inspired me to imitate her in my faith journey.

II. Mary is the best example and model of obedience

Mary is the obedient Handmaid of the Lord. She listened to the Angel and said: "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word." (Luke 1:38)

Mary obeyed:

- the civil law and journeyed with Joseph to Bethlehem for the enrolment.

May my beloved Mother continue to inspire and help me to accomplish the will of God in my life in living my way of life as an Apostolic Carmel sister.

Now I come to Mother Mary. Nowhere is it said that she had dreams. Surely she must have had many dreams. After she said yes, she must have dreamt about her future, and later about her own son. May be, we will know her dreams after we reach heaven. I am sure that she has some dreams for me too. Being a silent woman she kept everything pondering in her heart.

Joseph too had dreams, but his dreams were all while asleep. I wonder if they shared their dreams with one another. In that Holy Family, Jesus, Mary and Joseph, they seemed to be contemplatives. It was a silent, prayerful family. All the three, had their own dreams, and they pondered them in their hearts.

Here they teach me, dream but be silent and prayerful. Ponder in your mind and heart what God speaks to you. Deep union and contemplation should be part of my life. Yes, the Holy Family was a family with dreams. They sought the will of God and that was their hunger and thirst.

Mother had limited ordinary saris, bought by my father. My father had only two sets of clothes for he said, wear one and wash the other. If he was gifted with new set of clothes, the same day, one set would be given to a poor man. I can write volumes about the holiness of these two. They had one big dream and it was that their children spend their life serving the Church.

No wonder they offered six of their children (two boys to the Society of Jesus and four daughters to the Apostolic Carmel) for the service of the Church. May God be their reward. My beloved mother had a dream similar to that of my father. They prepared us to love and serve. Their love for the Church was very visible in what they spoke and did.

Mary's dream and her yes made her the Mother of God and my mother. Mother Veronica's dream gave birth to the Congregation of the Apostolic Carmel and she is our mother. My mother too dreamt for her children's future and by her silent and exemplary life she became our mother.

Let us all begin to dream and dream big, and do great things for God by living up to our prophetic mission.

A Woman With A Vision For Tomorrow

Way back in the 19th century, two Wright brothers had conceived an idea in their minds. They had not even finished their high school studies. They were the first to design and build a flying craft that could be controlled while in the air. They were not scientists in the true sense of the word. Their relentless pursuit of that dream was rewarded with an accomplishment



that changed world travel. A true example of turning dream into reality.

In the year 1862, Mother Veronica as a missionary sister of the Congregation of St Joseph of the Apparition, landed at



Mangalore, then went to Calicut. She found that the young girls of the coastal region of Malabar were deprived of education as there were no schools for women at that time. Besides, the Catholic faith of these young girls was also at stake, as they were lured by the Protestant missionaries to be converted to Protestantism. In the year 1868, her far sighted vision enabled her to found the Congregation of the Apostolic Carmel at Bayonne, France, with the specific goal of education and faith formation of young

girls along the West Coast of India. For Mother Veronica this was a period of intense suffering of body, mind and spirit and the beginning of a series of challenges that increased in intensity and finally led to the closing down of the cradle house of the Apostolic Carmel at Bayonne in 1873, within five years of its founding. All her dreams were shattered. She had no sense of fulfillment but only failure. But Mother Veronica clung to Jesus on the Cross and spent the rest of her life in the cloistered

Carmel of Pau, France, in total surrender to God's plan in her life to unfold.

In the year 1870, Mother Veronica had sent a band of three sisters to Mangalore, India, to carry out the mission she envisioned for the starting of Catholic educational institutions, to empower young girls. Consecrated persons are like candles that burn and ignite other candles spreading the light of faith and knowledge. Teaching is a vocation, a divine call to mould and form the raw clay in their hands. Today, the year 2023, the Apostolic Carmel Congregation she founded, has crossed over the post sesquicentennial milestone of its presence in India. Thousands of students, especially girls, have been given a strong foundation in values which has enabled them to be light bearers and messengers of God's love in their own families and in the society and has made them enlightened citizens and vibrant agents in the world. Mother Veronica's advice that her daughters should be true religious and not just pious teachers is applicable to us today and tomorrow as well. All the documents of the Church on religious life bear out this reminder that consecrated commitment is more important for the apostolate than any activity that they undertake, no matter how effective and opportune.

In this changing world, where technology over-rules man, the educators, should remember that today's students cannot be taught with 'yesterdays skills' and cannot be conquered and motivated with 'yesterdays tricks'. Everything – good and bad – is available at the click of a mouse or at the touch of a mobile key. So, we as Apostolic Carmel educators, have adapted to the changing times and striven to be mentors, facilitators, guides and counselors in order to provide the all round training of mind, body and soul of the pupils entrusted to our care. The

contemporary world heavily depends upon the computer, mobile phone and the internet to function effectively, efficiently and with high speed. The sisters have been equipped to use these means of rapid communication to influence the young for the better, taking care not to become the victims and consumerists of these media gadgets, not forgetting their call, their responsibility and duty towards the society.

The present day education is commercialised. In the urban areas where we serve, educational institutions are mushrooming everywhere. There is a School or College at every stone throw. We are not able to compete with the infrastructure and standard maintained in these Institutions. Neither can we close down the Institutions we have already started. In the spirit of Mother Veronica the predilection for the poor and needy must characterise our service always, whether in urban or in rural area, for Jesus came preaching the Gospel to the poor.

The modern world is living a culture of death. As consecrated persons, the Apostolic Carmel sisters are called to live and to uphold the values passed on by Mother Veronica and address the needs of real and relevant education today. There are many ways of re-living the spirit of Mother Veronica, her deep faith, humility, obedience, love for Jesus; her total dependence on God, detachment; her heroic courage in suffering and her desire to fulfill God's plan. As we journey into the future, the spark of her Charism in our hearts needs constantly to be re-kindled and set ablaze to ignite the light of faith, knowledge and love in all those we serve.





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
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Mother Veronica's Flight to Heaven ! Glimpses from the History of St Ann's –

"The great bell tolled just once in the convent at Pau. Mother Veronica was dead. She had asked that the usual Carmelite circular which follows on the death of a sister be withheld after her own passing away. A simple white stone marked the place where they laid her remains.

They said it was her tomb. But was it mere coincidence that the year of her passing away saw the completion of the convent that had so large a place in her life's work? No one watching the steady growth of the building of St Ann's in far-off Mangalore, knew of the bent figure in the Carmel of Pau, whose heart was enshrined in it. None thought of the finished chapel, the enlarged school and the new community rooms as the glorious tomb of an unknown Carmelite in France.

And yet, they stood because of her. Today they stand a lasting monument to the memory of her who never saw them, but whose courage, generosity and fortitude made possible their existence.

Only in heaven will the Apostolic Carmel realize all that it owes to its mother and foundress, Mother Veronica of Jesus.

As we celebrate the Birth Bi Centenary of this great woman, we cannot but thank God for the great gift of Mother Veronica to the Church, for she had been found worthy to start the Apostolic Carmel Congregation which in turn has given so many stalwarts to carry out the mission for the Church!

A Daring Step... From the Annals of St Ann's...!

'During these years, Sr Beatrice as Principal faced a difficult situation when the B.Ed College was informed that there were seven irregular admissions and that these seven students were from appearing for the examination that were to debarred commence in a week. The situation was tragic and all that the students could do was to cry, as they had nearly completed the course. It had happened when a circular that had come early in the academic year regarding general education subjects required for professional education in the B.Ed College were exactly specified but the details had been overlooked by the Principal. As it was her wont dear Sr Beatrice was calm but not inactive. Taking the 7 students with her she left immediately for Bangalore where she was given a warm welcome by Sr Philomena who helped her and shared the burden with her for the rest of the time The Director of Public Instruction was adamant since the decision had been made by the Senate in Mysore. All that we got from him was blame. The next thing to do was to reach Mysore as soon as possible and meet the Vice-Chancellor. Taking the girls with them, Srs Beatrice and Philomena reached Mysore, just in time to meet the Vice-Chancellor at his door-step. On hearing their story and wanting to be of help and finding that he was unable to go back personally on a decision made by the senate, he looked more sympathetic and said, "I will give you a solution. Go back to Bangalore and file a writ petition against *me*," the Vice-Chancellor. The sisters were literally taken aback and dumb founded, knowing little about law and still less about stay order. The Vice-Chancellor got into his car and left and the two sisters with the seven girls came to Mangalore as they could not think of a writ petition without Mother General's permission. Having put the case before the General Council as Mother General was away, they hurried back to Bangalore, got

the services of Mr Sundarswamy our advocate and the help of Mr Thakoor, who typed out the seven copies of the writ petition by his office and they were filed the day after in the High Court. The stay order came within the few days. The girls answered their exam and we did not withdraw the writ petition until the results of the seven girls were received and published. Every one of these seven students passed. Thanks to God and the Vice-Chancellor who provided the solution'

this retreat, because it all happened at the last moment. Four days prior to the retreat, I met Sr Archana who told me that they were having charism retreat in Maryhill by Sr Linette A.C. I just causally asked her whether there was a seat. Immediately her reply was, ask the superior. After that I didn't bother to do anthing. Within two days I got a call from Sr Juliana Mary asking me whether I would like to join the retreat. I felt happy. Meanwhile during the same week, I got a substitute teacher to handle my class. So, I strongly felt that this was God's doing.

Maryhill being the cradle (Novitiate) of my religious life, attending this retreat provided me an opportunity to reminiscence, re-live, refresh, and renew my novitiate fervour once again. The natural beauty of the surroundings, the silence and solitude, the daily Eucharistic celebration with deep insights, a comfortable stay with nutritious food, no doubt added to this retreat experience.

Bougainvillea

These plants can grow up to 40 feet height with support. They are shrubby plants with lot of thorns. They are also called paper flowers because their bracts are thin and papery. The flowers are small, tubular and

The colourful bracts outshine the plant's true flower, They appear periodically throughout the year, especially in winter and summer. When you plant Bougainvillea right round the compound, They beautify the whole campus. Passersby enjoy the beauty of the same. They require full sun light and actually perform better when their soil is left a little dry. They can tolerate the hot sun. Even though you don't water them they



have flowers in plenty.

You can trim them and shape them artistically as per your delight. They can grow over fences and trellises, they are even espaliers. used for There are also dwarf varieties of plants which can be planted in a pot on the terrace,

yard, on top of a wall or in hanging baskets provided they get the full sunlight. The best time to prune bougainvillea is in late



winter or early spring, after they flowers to the full or at the start of rainy season. You can even use the smaller cuttings to have more plants. If you do, you'll be able to share the beautiful plants with your friends and make your city or village colourful. 

"Golden Jubilarians - Glimpses"

I feel proud and happy to introduce our 2023 Golden Jubilee batch as a unique and special batch which God Himself brought together in His own time. Our batch is very much connected with the life of our holy founderVenerable Mother Veronica and the history of our beloved congregation - the Apostolic Carmel.



We joined the Apostolic Carmel in the year 1970 and were warmly welcomed by our then Superior General, late Mother Theodosia of golden memory. She called us the Centenary Candidates because the centenary of the establishment of the Apostolic Carmel was celebrated that year.

In the year 1973 we made our first profession. A hundred years ago i.e., in 1873 October, Monsignor La Croix, the Bishop of Bayonne, did not permit any religious from his diocese to go to the Carmelite Mission in India. Hence Mother Veronica was forced to close down the Little Carmel of St. Joseph, the cradle of the Apostolic Carmel in Bayonne. She then re-entered the Cloistered Carmel at Pau where the prioress Mother Marie of the Immaculate Conception received her with open arms.

We are celebrating the Golden Jubilee of our religious profession in the Apostolic Carmel in the year 2023 and our celebration coincides with the celebration of Mother Veronica's birth bicentenary. Are we not right in claiming that ours is a privileged batch whose journey in the Apostolic Carmel is very much related and connected with the life of our beloved foundress and the history of our congregation?

We are extremely grateful to our Superior General, Sr Maria

Nirmalini, for organizing the Renewal Programme at the Generalate in Jayanagar. Our hearts resonate with gratitude to Sr Linette, the Assistant Superior General, who meticulously planned and presented every input



session with PPT, questions for reflection and for sharing in small groups. She saw to every convenience and that we had enough time to relax and reflect. Twenty-six of us were to attend this programme but seven were not able to travel and be present for the same. Hence 19 of us i.e. 8 from the Karnataka Province, 4 from the Southern, 5 from the Eastern, I from the Western and one from the Northern Province were privileged to attend the Renewal Programme and meet each other as a batch for the last time.

Our stay was at Saranya and all the sessions were arranged at Saranya itself. Care was taken not to overburden us with the preparation of Morning Prayer, Liturgy etc. In the refectory we were welcomed with a song by the First Year Temporary Professed Sisters, along with their mistress. There seemed to be a big generation gap between the First year Temporary Professed and us 50 years after profession. The younger sisters were very considerate and ever ready to help us, allowing us to serve the food first. The three hosts at Saranya, Srs Maria Carmela, Iris and Judith Mary were very attentive to our needs, providing us with nutritious food and a variety of dishes so that we may not fall sick. With their care and concern, none of us fell sick; rather we enjoyed better health during our stay there.

We began the Renewal Programme on 2 May. The day happened to be the feast and 75th birthday of Sr Monica D'Souza, one of the Golden Jubilarians. A very meaningful and beautiful morning prayer was conducted by Sr Maria Roopa and the Mass was offered for her intentions. After Mass she was greeted by the Generalate members, Lourdes Community and her own batch mates with the cutting of the cake, hugs and wishes.

At 9 a.m. we had the inaugural of the Renewal Programme in the presence of the Generalate team and the Superior of Lourdes Community. In order not to cause any anxiety and tension to the Jubilarians, Sr Linette herself had planned every detail of the inauguration with PPT etc. We were the happy recipients of all that she presented to us.

Right at the beginning she put us at ease saying, "My voice may lull you to sleep, feel free to sleep; feel free to get up and walk out if you need to do so. No need to excuse yourself." She had told us that the quality of our old age will depend on our capacity to grasp the meaning and appreciate values. By quoting Carl Jung's theory she made us compare human life to the 3 phases of the sun's movements.

1. Rising sun or the dawn 2. Midday sun. 3. Setting sun.

Our life follows the path of the sun. Having looked back at our dawn and the midday, we look ahead with trust and hope to prepare ourselves to meet the Lord of our lives face to face. When we came to know that Sr Nirmalini was away in Africa, we were very sad that we may not be able to meet her. Our joy knew no bounds, when like lightning, she made her appearance on 4th May, with a lap top in hand to take up the session as per the schedule. She told us to look back on our life's journey and discover the Emmaus episode in our own life. 'Trust the Stranger' was her theme. She made us go through our life journey and recall the grace-filled accompaniment of our Lord on the path of life and share this story of both Jesus and me travelling together with another.

During the sessions that followed, we were made aware of some of the sins we senior sisters tend to indulge in:

- Continuing to be busy with the outside world by resisting the call to interiority
- Indulging in gossip and unhealthy distractions.
- Giving up hope and getting into depression

Our sunset years remind us of who we are and what we are called to be. Our prayer now has to take a change. It is not merely acts of prayer but experiencing the loving gaze of God, just being in the presence before the Eucharistic Lord; being aware of His presence in creation and around; growing in gratitude, hope and faith and celebrating the unfailing companionship of the Lord, His care and compassion.

Some of the helps to carry home were:-

- 1. Never own a disease e.g. "I am a.....or I am suffering from...." By saying so you make the disease part of your life, you own it and it becomes your identity. Words carry vibrations and we become what we say, Self-care is our responsibility.
- 2. Embrace the cross. Daily dying to self that Christ may grow in us. Purification and detachment have to be part of our life. If we resist the cross, we will suffer more. It is in accepting the cross that we find tranquility and peace.
- **3.** Let go of all our attachments and frills. The way of nature is the law of life.

4. Learn 'to leave', 'to let go', 'joyful farewell' Eternal youth is a very dangerous illusion. Being old is just as beautiful and important. The 'stage' is not a permanent place for anyone.

5. Spend more time in reflection, reading of the Scripture. Keep close to the Lord and remain warm in love.

The sharing sessions were very enriching and inspiring. They filled us with gratitude and appreciation at the way our companions have grown in the love and union with God. We were full of joy and gratitude as we returned from our Renewal Programme.

After breakfast, we met the ACA members from all over Karnataka.



It was two days programme. Those who came from out station stayed overnight and all the arrangements were made for them.

Sr Rose Agnes, welcomed us and she gave a talk on "How one can become a saint?" She gave us many examples. We may not have money or things to give, but a smile, a loving word, positive stroke, pat on the back, encouraging word will help us on the way to become a saint. She also shared about different saints, their life, the sufferings that they had and how they reached sainthood. She explained this to us through power point presentation, and we could follow it easily.

Mother Veronica sent her three sisters to India, and established the Apostolic Carmel Congregation at St Ann's, on 16 July 1870. She thought of others first, the poor children and the sick. She served them selflessly. Little Flower of Jesus or St Therese was another example - to do little things with love. She had to look after an old, sick sister in her convent. That sister was always unhappy with her services and used to grumble at her and find fault with her. But St Therese, quietly without uttering a word served her patiently and lovingly. She used to pray inside the four walls for the missionaries, and she became a saint. She dedicated little acts of love for the souls in purgatory.

We have yet another present day saint, St John Paul II. When he was a child, about seven years old, he lost his mother.

It was as a time of world war. He had to face a lot of hardship and difficulties. His father gave up his job to remain with his two sons, by doing tailoring. Soon he too died due to sickness. After sometime his older brother also died, leaving Karol an orphan. Karol ran to Mother Mary, fell at her feet, cried and clung to her and took her as his own mother. He had great devotion towards Mother Mary, and would never miss rosary and cultivated the habit of praying as many rosaries as possible. No wonder, during the attempt to assassinate him, our Lady protected him and saved his life.

After the talk we had the Eucharistic Celebration, during which one person from each unit - altogether 25 persons - had to carry a lighted lamp and place it at the feet of Mother Veronica. During the Eucharistic Celebration, nine members made their permanent affiliation. From Udupi unit, Mrs Nirmala D'Souza made her permanent affiliation. After lunch, Sr Julie Anne gave us a talk. Then Sr Ancilla A.C., General Co-ordinator for the ACA's, spoke to us and wished us well.

The Carmel Blossoms of St Agnes enacted the life story of Mother Veronica. Each unit had to present a yearly report. Mrs Renny Suares presented our report. 

A child, whose parents were separated, and was left in the Crèche, the sisters, went all out to get her admitted into a good school and saw to her welfare. After her studies, the girl went abroad and got a job. When the sister got the news that she is returning to the Island, she took trouble to trace where her father's grave was. For she was returning for the first time after his death. The girl arrived just a month before the sister's death.(8).
- 9. She was the first instructress for typewriting at Vijaymari Tech. Institution at Mayhill. She worked as office Superintendent in CBCI as well as the National Vocation and Service Centre and Ishvani Kendra, Pune. In 1991 she handled evening classes for women domestic workers at Bandra. It was marvelous to see the way she taught them, not only English, but Needle work, Art and Craft, and also helped them stage Christmas Plays and had Carols sung by them. (6).
- 10. This Sister, lived her last 45 years in Bhagalpur. She supervised the building construction of the Convent and school. She daily trudged 5 miles in the morning and returned at 6 p.m. to join the sisters for Prayer, supper and recreation. Her love for priests was special. She revered them and when asked for her blessing she would say, "love Jesus and be faithful to your priesthood". Our Eucharistic Lord called her from this life in the Year of the Eucharist. (8)
- 11. She had her early schooling in St. Joseph's, Bajpe, Mangalore. While at school, she read lives of Saints. When reading St Therese, she felt the call to religious life. Early in religious life she experienced misunderstandings. She felt best to lay her life's problems in the Lord's hands and in truth, He helped her through. (5,5).

- 2. The feast day of St Teresa of Avila was the day when she was laid to rest. The funeral Mass was offered by the bishop of Kannur and her remains were blessed by the Arch bishop of Tellicherry. She was laid to rest in the new crypt on the left side of Sacred Heart Convent at Tellicherry. (6).
- 5. Quick witted and a conjuror at Card games and Ludo, she served the Lord in Sri Lanka at the best of times and was called to eternal glory while seeing the Island going through the worst of times. Though no longer young, she was Local Assistant, infirmarian, answered Phone calls and taught English till the age of 90.(5).
- 6. An 8-year-old, seriously ill with typhoid in a Boarding House, when asked by the Superior, if she wanted to receive Jesus here or in Heaven, answered 'Heaven.' At the age of 11, tired of the grand wedding reception of her aunt, she said to herself, "I will never get married." When a second year Junior, her first appointment was, Head Mistress of her own school at Tellicherry, and her own teachers were on the staff. She directed plays for All Kerala State Youth Festival and received the first prize twice. (6).

BACK:

- 3. Was born on the feast day of our Lady of the Rosary, as the first child of her parents. She winged her flight to heaven on Assumption Day. She lived 100 years and 10 months. She was an ardent lover of nature, birds and animals. When convent fowls were robbed, the local police caught the thief. The convent was missing a bird. This elderly sister went to the Station, where the birds were kept. She called out, 'Ye Re ye Re; the convent cock came along strutting proudly to her. (9).
- 7. She was simple, soft- spoken and an affectionate person. A sweet smile was a remarkable sign of her personality. She enjoyed good health until her diamond jubilee. She developed a wound in her right leg. It took a long time to heal. She disliked medicines and tonics. "God is my doctor" she would say. She refused to eat and take medicine as she felt this was useless as she is preparing to go to God. (7).

12. Her mother died when she was still in Primary School. While washing a saree, she slipped into a stream which was flowing swiftly. She cried out for help. A fisher man rescued her with his fishing net. In a dream, our Lady told her, that she would be a Carmelite in South India. She belonged to Gumla District. While working in Avila convent, Patna, as a domestic helper, she realized her dream was coming through. (10).
